

Black Gods of the Metropolis: The Drawings of J. Alan Cumbey

SEPT. 15, 2018 - JAN. 13, 2019

The late J. Alan Cumbey was a white gay man, a wellknown cultural writer of the 1980s and 1990s in Richmond, Virginia. What he kept private was that he was also a selftaught artist who created a large body of drawings exploring his identity and world as a gay Southerner.

Cumbey grew up in Southampton County playing under the tree where Nat Turner was hanged. In his drawings, he pictures himself as a black man, thus containing in one body two marginalized communities. When he died from complications of AIDS in 1992, Cumbey left a pictorial saga of his journey through the culture of race and sexuality of the American South.

Shift, Sift, Swoosh Bods is a multimedia installation of sculptures, sound, video performances and animations where the artist Levester Williams blurs the boundaries between performer, instrument and audience. His installation facilitates bodily interactions through these media — both visual and sonic displays. The artist disrupts presumed knowledge of being an object to be acted upon and being a subject that acts. Through performance, the artist invites the audience to reimagine the self by reorienting the body with action and sound, thereby shifting the self away from a mere observer to a more fluid state of agency.

Naomi lizuka reimagines Homer's epic hero Odysseus as a displaced and wary young refugee grappling with fabulous but contemporary monsters in this epic tale of finding one's way home. When asked why she chose to leave her Odyssean character nameless — he's called Anon and uses made-up names in his dread of being found out and deported — lizuka said, "it ... seemed like a very apt metaphor for what people have to do when they come to a new land. You change your name, or it's changed for you, ... You're faced with [changing] the core of your identity when you adapt. ... I was always intrigued by Odysseus' reunion with Penelope, and by the fact that she didn't recognize him. It was as if all the experiences he had on his travels had transformed him so much that he was a different person. ... I think immigrants are transformed in huge, overwhelming ways by their experiences."

FROM WILLIAMSBURG

Take I-64 East to Norfolk. Drive through the Hampton Roads Bridge-Tunnel. Approximately six miles after leaving the tunnel, you will see a sign saying, "To Terminal Boulevard/To Naval Bases." Follow Terminal Boulevard until you reach the third traffic light, where Terminal Boulevard and Hampton Boulevard intersect. Turn left onto Hampton Boulevard and follow until you reach the seventh traffic light. This is Hampton Boulevard and 49th Street, the entrance to the university.

FROM VIRGINIA BEACH

Take I-264 West to Downtown Norfolk. This highway turns into Waterside Drive. Follow Waterside Drive for several blocks, which turns into Boush Street. At the intersection of Boush and Brambleton Avenue turn left onto Brambleton. Move into the right lane. You will see a sign that says "To ODU." Merge with the traffic onto Hampton Boulevard. Follow Hampton Boulevard approximately three miles. The university will be located on your left at the corner of Hampton Boulevard and 49th Street.



FROM CHESAPEAKE

Take I-64 East toward Suffolk (from Deep Creek area, take I-64 West). Take the I-464 exit to Downtown Norfolk. Stay left on the Berkley Bridge, avoiding the I-264 exit, and take the Waterside Drive exit on the right once you cross the bridge. Follow Waterside Drive for several blocks, which turns into Boush Street. At the intersection of Boush and Brambleton Avenue turn left onto Brambleton. Move into the right lane. You will see a sign that says "To ODU." Merge with the traffic onto Hampton Boulevard. Follow Hampton Boulevard approximately three miles. The university will be located on your left at the corner of Hampton Boulevard and 49th Street.
